15th Jan'y 1819 This is a Copie of the last will and Testament of me Jonathan Bugg of
 Etimonton in the County of Middlesex Gentelman which will bears date the third day of
 Novr 1817 whereas I have by my said will given unto William Woodroff of Great Ouseburnt
 a sum of one hundred pounds and eight shillings two pence and also
 a third part of the residue of my Estate and have also appointed him one of the Executors to my said
 will and do hereby revoke the said Benjamin and also appointed one of the Executors to my said
 will in lieu thereof one hundred pounds only I have also by my said will given unto Mr. Jos.
 Young who is now in my office two hundred pounds and do hereby give unto the said Joseph
 Young in addition to that sum the sum of one hundred pounds and do nominate
 constitute and appoint him one of my Executors in the room of the said William Woodroff I give
 unto Sarah Baker fifty pounds over and above what I have given her by my said will I give
 unto my worthy friend John de Haer Esq. ten Guineas for a Ring I give unto Mr. John Adams
 ten Guineas for a Ring I give unto Mr. Jos. Baker ten Guineas for a Ring and it is my will
 and do hereby further direct that the duty stamp duty payable on the said will left by my
 said will to Mr. Sarah Debbory may be paid out of the residue of my Estate in or to the said
 man have the duty there of all Expenses and do hereby confirm my said will except so far

twenty Guineas for his care and trouble in the care of this my will besides his Expences herein
and to Mr. Brett the Treasurer for Guineas for mourning apparel the two Guineas last mentioned
to be paid three Calendar months next after my decease and give and bequeath out of my personal
estate unto the said Mr. Brett my said wife the sum of one hundred pounds sterling the said money
to be paid twelve Calendar months next after my decease also give and bequeath out of my
personal estate unto Mary the wife of Collins of Charlton in the County of Suffolk
the sum of four pounds to be paid three Calendar months next after my decease for
mourning apparel and so give my said wife and estate as soon as convenient after my decease
to pay and discharge out of my personal estate a debt of sixty pounds principal money due
from me upon a promissory note by me in relation to the said Collins and his brother
did join and also any interest due for the same in case I do not in my life time pay all or the
principal and interest as aforesaid being also give and bequeath unto the said my
loving wife the sum of one hundred pounds sterling to be paid one Calendar month next
after my decease and besides the sum of two hundred pounds which I have devised
to her or so intend that this devise of my mourning shall serve to her out of my personal
estate according to the agreement made on our marriage and I give to her my said wife
all the furniture plate and effects which were her own at the time of our marriage to and
for her own use and benefit the same to be delivered as soon as possible after my decease being
all mentioned in an inventory that I have made by me and I give her five Guineas for mourning
apparel immediately after my decease and a mourning ring with all convenient speed and
my devise is that my said wife shall not pay law her residence in my present dwelling house
for the space of three Calendar months next after my decease but I give my wife upon
her request and at the cost of my said wife and estate to retain all her said and things and things
and title of some and things at the common law out of my real estate as I do intend that
the benefit which she will receive by this my will shall be in satisfaction of her said and
things also I give to the said servant living with me at my decease five Guineas for
mourning apparel to be paid immediately after that time and after payment of all my just
debts and my funeral and testamentary charges and the charges and sums of money
and scribbles given and directed to be paid I give and bequeath all and singular my goods
and chattels for money goods chattels stock in the funds and personal estate whatsoever and
whosoever unto the said Charlotte Brett my said wife and for her own use and benefit to wit
whereof the said Charles Brett has to his my will retained on two sheets of paper out my
hand and affixed my seal to wit my said wife to the first sheet and my said wife and seal to
the last sheet the first sheet being the twenty eighth day of February in the year of our said
eight hundred and nineteenth year. *Chas. Brett Esq.* signed sealed published and delivered by
the said Charles Brett the testator as and for his last will and testament in the presence of us who
in his presence at his request and in the presence of each other have subscribed our names as
witnesses to the said instrument the first by *Chas. Brett Esq.* the second by *E. D. Browne* the third by *Ann Utting* the fourth by *Wm Utting*.
